- ▶ ¹³ Some Jews who went around driving out evil spirits tried to invoke the name of the Lord Jesus over those who were demon-possessed. They would say, “In the name of the Jesus whom Paul preaches, I command you to come out.” ¹⁴ Seven sons of Sceva, a Jewish chief priest, were doing this. ¹⁵ One day the evil spirit answered them, “Jesus I know, and Paul I know about, but who are you?” ¹⁶ Then the man who had the evil spirit jumped on them and overpowered them all. He gave them such a beating that they ran out of the house naked and bleeding.

- ▶ ¹⁷ When this became known to the Jews and Greeks living in Ephesus, they were all seized with fear, and the name of the Lord Jesus was held in high honor. ¹⁸ Many of those who believed now came and openly confessed what they had done. ¹⁹ A number who had practiced sorcery brought their scrolls together and burned them publicly. When they calculated the value of the scrolls, the total came to fifty thousand drachmas.^[a] ²⁰ In this way the word of the Lord spread widely and grew in power

AT 16, Coledale's Blake Johnson is the youngest Club Captain in the 100-year history of Surf Life Saving in Australia.

Blake was a surprise nominee for the role of Club Captain at the Coledale Surf Life Saving Club's recent Annual General Meeting but beat his nearest nominee by four votes to one.

A Year 10 student at Holy Spirit College in Bellambi, Blake has been heavily involved in Coledale Surf Club since a young age and this year was named the Illawarra Youth Life Saver of the year.

He may be young, but Blake has big plans for the club, which has been having trouble hanging on to younger members for some time.

Blake said something needs to be done to keep people in their late teens at the club.

"I want to try and get youth and the nippers more active in the club and try and get Coledale back on the map," he said.

"It's just matter of keeping them when they've been trained.

"We are in urgent need of new young members and the club needs to conduct an extensive recruiting campaign."

Blake said at first he was worried whether he would be up to the task of Club Captain, considering his school commitments, but he is certainly not doing it alone.

Blake's older sister Tara is Club Secretary and his mum Judy was recently elected as the club's Vice President.

Together the three of them make up 75 per cent of the Executive Committee.

Judy Johnson said she and Tara will be on hand to make sure Blake doesn't get too caught up in the fame of being Captain.

"It hasn't really gone to his head yet," she said.

"We'll be here keeping him in line." Despite beginning his Higher School Certificate next year Blake said he would like to run again for Club Captain, but rejected the idea of running for presidency of the club when he comes of age.

"No way," he said.


